# CHNS 3401A-3404A Advanced Chinese II (高级汉语 II)

#### I. Instructors, texts, classes, small-group conversation sessions and office hours

All classes start promptly. Check the weekly "section chart (分班表; fēn bān biǎo; "divide-class-chart")" to find out which drill section you are in. The students in each section will change from week to week.

### The lecture sessions will start with a quiz, which has two parts:

- (2) Except for the first quiz, there will be two short fill-in-the-blanks-with-the-words-given paragraphs

#### CHNS 3401-3404 Advanced Mandarin Chinese (II) aims to help the students to:

- 1. Master the most commonly used lexical and syntactic items for the formal register
- 2. Understand the common social, political and cultural issues in Chinese societies
- 3. Build paragraph-level oral and writing proficiencies
- 4. Learn to support opinions in well-organized paragraphs, discuss issues in abstract terms, hypothesize, and handle linguistically unfamiliar situations
- 5. Learn to become a life-long independent learner of Chinese

#### How to easily locate the class web site

When on campus and if your computer is connected to the Internet via a network cable or the "MiddleburyCollege" (Middlebury E-Mail username and password; choose "PEAP" instead of "SIM" for mobile phones), type "go/416" in the address bar of the web browser, and press "Enter". When off campus, type the full course website URL instead. You will be prompted to log in to the Middlebury College Central Authentication Service. Once you have logged in, you will be directed to the course website right away. If you are still denied access, it is most likely because the official Level 4 class list has not been updated to include you. E-Mail Zhang laoshi (jzhan@middlebury.edu) to request access then. Be sure to include your Middlebury E-Mail username, and your English name in your email message.

### Check the class web site regularly, and print course materials on your own

The weekly schedules, texts, written assignments, text and vocabulary recordings, weekly section charts, one-on-one/one-on-two session schedules, etc. will all be posted on the course website. You will need to **print out the texts and the written assignment sheets yourselves before class** for preview purposes and for note-taking in class at the Main Library, the Armstrong Science Library in MBH (McCardell Bicentennial Hall), or a number of computer/language labs in Sunderland, Munroe, Axinn, etc.).

Middlebury College Chinese School

Each summer school student has a free-printing quota of **500** pages. You can check your count once you log in to **Papercut**: <a href="http://papercut.middlebury.edu">http://papercut.middlebury.edu</a>. When on campus, you can type **go/papercut** in the address bar to get to the web page. The steps for printing is as follows: log on to Papercut  $\rightarrow$  web print  $\rightarrow$  submit a job  $\rightarrow$  choose a printer (do **not** choose **CHINESE 1, 2, 3, 4, or 5**, which are reserved for the Chinese School faculty and staff)  $\rightarrow$  upload files  $\rightarrow$  choose how many copies  $\rightarrow$  send request. Then, go to the room that houses the web printer chosen just now to release the print job(s) by using the "print release station" in the room.

There are **NO make-ups** for daily quizzes if you are late for classes unless arrangements have been made **in advance**. The two lowest daily quiz scores will be dropped.

# IV. Others (其他 / qítā)

# 1. Learning tips 學習建議 / 学习建议 / xuéxí jiànyì for preview (預習/预习/yùxí):

- **Step 1:** Skim the new text without looking up the glossary for the gist of the article.
- **Step 2:** Answer as many questions in the assignments for preview purpose as possible.
- **Step 3:** Listen to the recording of the vocabulary list in the text and study the words while repeatedly listening to the recording.
- **Step 4:** Listen to the recording of the text, and **read along aloud repeatedly**.
- **Step 5:** Read the grammar notes without spending too much time on them.
- **Step 6:** Finish up the written assignments for preview purpose.
- **Step 7:** When you feel ready, do a self-paced dictation of a few paragraphs of the text, or just copy a few paragraphs text by hand.
- **Step 8:** If you have questions on the vocabulary, grammar points and/or past assignments, etc, go to the office hours. Answers to questions in the written assignments due **next day** will NOT be given to you during office hours, though.

### 2. Tips for classroom learning (課堂學習/课堂学习 / kètáng xuéxí):

- 1. Come to class well prepared and well rested.
- 2. Actively participate in all kinds of practice and activities.

#### 3. Getting your tests, homework, etc., back

All graded daily quizzes, written exams, written assignments, and any other handouts will be put in the **Hepburn Lounge**. Look for the **blue Level IV filing crate** (labeled "四年级") and the **hanging folders with your Chinese names on it**.

#### When to expect to get them back:

Daily quizzes  $\rightarrow$  by 8 pm, same day Daily written assignments  $\rightarrow$  by 8 pm, same day.

**Exception**: assignments due on **Friday** will be returned to you by **12pm on Saturday**.

Weekly oral report feedback sheets → following Monday, during one-on-one session

Weekly written exams  $\rightarrow$  by 8 pm, same day

### 4. Special advising groups

Each student will be assigned a teacher "advisor" from week 2 on. During lunchtime on Thursdays, your advisor will sit with your group in the back of the Atwater seating area to discuss issues and/or concerns of yours.

### 5. Laptops or mobile devices **NOT** allowed in class

Refrain from using your laptop or mobile devices such as a cell phone or a tablet to look up words. Use the Chinese words you already know to explain what you intend to say instead. Circumlocution is an important skill. If you use a tablet to take notes in class, do not use a frame to prop it up; in other words, leave it flat on your tablet chair or the desk.
